What seriously upsets me is not just the vandalism, but I believe there's a lot of drugs going on in that park, because of the environment that it has being hidden and dark.

I'm retired. I was walking my -- my dog one afternoon; came behind a car that was -- I've never seen before, and there were three or four guys. These were not kids. These were full-grown guys sitting in a car. And they came up behind. They waved; I waved. And as they came by, I just took my cell phone and I was going to just do a hip shot of the back of the car. They yelled and they burned rubber out of there. It was very devious. Something was going on. The next day at the same time they were there.

I've seen people sitting in the park on

the problems, but it will prevent a lot of problems, period.

THE CHAIR: Deputy Gundersen, do you want to address any of these issues? Do you have any input for us?

CORPORAL GUNDERSEN: Yeah, I met with Mr. Stoller probably -- I think it was shortly after Thanksgiving, and we increased our patrols out there.

And I'm going to ask you, because, you know, I'm just getting the reports from the deputies. They -- they email me every day based on their patrol of the park.

Have you seen an increase in the patrols and deputies out there at the park within the last —

MR. STOLLER: Yeah. I believe that -- I heard that there was -- at night one time there was a lot going on. I don't know the details on it. I've see more vehicles going around. And I honestly believe that your -- you guys are doing the best job you can do, but I just believe that by redesigning the park, we can prevent -- prevent a lot of problems.

Some of the people there have said that they know some of those people there; it's a bad crowd. The drugs is the most upsetting thing to me. We've been vandalized twice, and I've seen other things go on, and I've -- in doing the petition, I've talked to everyone around the park. They've all not hesitated to sign it, and they're -- they're also very, very concerned.

What -- I don't want to make a speech here, but one person said to me that if -- you know, it stood out in my mind. A young lady with young kids, she said that she moved in here about a year ago, invested in a home; loved the area; it's so charming. She said, "But if I knew what was going on here a year ago, I wouldn't have moved in." That made an -- an impact on me.

So what I'm presenting is simple changes that are preventative. It doesn't solve all
