We've got mulch all over this place. We got to get rid of some of this mulch in these areas that's going to wash down into these pipes.

So that's one of the other things we're going to do while we're addressing the park issues. I would rather address something like

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go out. But if we have a -- as she says, if you have an unusual, large amount of rain that summer or that winter or that period, we're just not designed for it to go out here.

I mean, I met with the County also last week to see if they can clean out some CSX railway storm drain areas that we have over there, so they're going to start talking to their people about some storm drains cleanup. So they keep isolating, not just jumping the wall and going through any private property, but they also destroy or throw elements or, you know -- and I don't want to be calling the cops for every single incident.

I did call to do a report on the mailbox this past week, because the mailbox was destroyed. And, you know, it's interruptance. Sometimes it's at three in the morning, one in the morning. We all get up, because the dog is barking, the lights of the neighbors are going off, and kids are running and yelling and screaming through the property. And it's just
