Because it seems like when we catch a few, they can trespass warning them. I got to double-check with him, because it's hard to trespass a kid that lives in here, because he actually has a resident address. They've been able to trespass one of the kids that are from the other side or not in the neighborhood. But if they actually have an ID that has a actual address, at least that way, they can speak with their parents. Majority of time, they have pretty good luck speaking with the parents. Every once in a while, you get one of those that, you know, thinks their kid can't do wrong.

You probably saw on your there's cars parked along that side when 24 24 there's cars on both ends of it. But they have communications that RDC had a conflict, and 25 25 blocked the cul-de-sac. And we have had a fire they could not attend. In reviewing the

minutes, I think they're — I don't know that we have a complete consensus or at least I don't have a full understanding of what we expect from these presentations today. I know that we certainly want to give RDC an opportunity to present anything they may choose.

Erin, do you have any thoughts on how this impacts the RFP process if we were to do one?

MS. McCORMICK: Well, through the RFP process, we would do an advertisement, and then whoever is interested would submit proposals, and we could then have presentations at that point. So there is going to be that formal process and opportunity for presentations and for the board members to question the contractors. I don't know if there's a desire today to just ask some preliminary questions. But I think it is a good idea to at least let the contractors know that we are anticipating that there will be a formal RFP process, so that may govern what you would want to say today.

MS. STEWART: Mark, may I make a couple

design it to bid it. There you go.

RDC is kind of similar. They can have, like, a turnkey operation where they can design and bid it. You worked with them ten years ago, so you're familiar with how their process works.

But I believe you'll find both Hardeman Kempton and Florida Water Features and PlayStructures have similar experience, but a slightly different perspective. And I think it will help you try to figure out which direction you want to go. Whether you want something turnkey, whether at that point in time you'll do an RFP for a turnkey operation, or just professional consulting. You know, I think—I think, based on how significant the projects are going to be, you're going to have to, I think, make that determination.

THE CHAIR: Okay. Any supervisor comments or thoughts? I'm inclined to give them at least five minutes each just to tell us what they want to tell us. We obviously have their materials. And kind of open it up to them to decide -- they can tell us anything they want to tell us. They don't have to get

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comments? Just to make sure that the board understands, what we did was, at the last board meeting, you wanted to make sure you had the three vendors here to be able to talk to you. And I think it's important to understand that each one of these vendors actually bring a different perspective to the table. And I think it may help advise you in terms of the approach you want to take on the project, because one is a contractor, one is a designer, designing it and bidding it. And so I think each one of them are going to offer something differently to try to give you an opportunity to figure out which direction you want to take.

THE CHAIR: I'm confused. I thought all of them were design/build.

MS. STEWART: No. No. Hardeman Kempton, when you speak with them, they're more of a design/bid the -- bid the package together for -- through the RFP process. Okay.

Florida Water Features and
PlayStructures, he can't design. He doesn't
design. I believe he hires consultants. As
far as his package, he can design it and then
actually build it. He doesn't necessarily

into any details of what they're actually proposing. We don't need to hear the dollars or anything like that. Just a general introductory statement. I'm sure they've done it before. Why don't we start the Hardeman and Kempton, if that's okay.

MR. RINARD: No problem. Scoot up here if that's okay. Sorry to have my back to you all. My name is Jason Rinard. I'm a partner. I'm also a landscape architect with Hardeman Kempton & Associates. We're a landscape architecture firm and civil engineering firm. I've got a package here that, you know -- I will keep this to five minutes for everybody's benefit. But you all can go through this.

There are a couple key things I want to point out. We are a design consulting firm. Tonja kind of nailed it on the head as the -- we would look at your park projects in terms of safety issues, in terms of some of the criteria that was just mentioned here from concerns from the residents. We'd look at it from accessibility, ADA-based issues, making sure we're compliant.

But we have the tools in having the civil

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engineering. We also have affiliations with two construction companies, one being Hardeman Landscape Nursery, which is a landscape construction management company. Then also Sitecrafters of Florida, which does site infrastructure, basically, pipe in the ground, storm water improvements and that stuff.

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Holistically, we can look at your site from the entire site parameters and the context of the neighborhood and basically do an assessment, look at the good, the bad, the ugly, what works today, what doesn't work today. What needs to be improved. And from that, we can put together design documents. We can start with a schematic-level approach, looking at a master plan. Some of the graphics in there just show some of the different types of presentation tools we use. We use plan view, which is just two dimensional. A lot of people can't understand that. So we get into three-dimensional modeling, which really just gives you a very realistic idea of what it is ultimately that's going to be built.

The reason I mention the construction companies is not so much that we would offer a

large-scale level to a small-scale level. So if you need to get resident buy-in on any of these improvements, we have experience with that as well.

And then from there, we can put together the construction documents, take it through permitting, assist you with the bid review, and evaluation and selection process. And then, once you've basically selected the contractor, we get involved with construction oversight, coming out of certain milestones of the project to make sure that what was bid on is actually getting implemented in the ground.

So I'll leave it at that. Hopefully, that's short and sweet enough. Obviously, the -- my contact information is in this package, if you all want to do a little more research about us. My business partner, Ted Kempton, I believe he's been here a few times to talk with you about other relevant or other projects, I should say, in the past. So we're both Tampa natives, you know, we've been in Florida. We graduated from the University of Florida, so we're very familiar with a lot of the -- well, certain legislation,

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turnkey like the other two contractors that are going to present to you, it's the fact that we have two companies that we can base our budgeting and our construction methodology and quality control. And that has been a huge asset in a lot of our park designs. We've done a lot of work for the City of Tampa, Hillsborough County, Polk County, City of Lakeland, Temple Terrace.

I've also -- I only have two packages. There's a neighborhood park portfolio here too. I forgot to mention Tampa Palms, which we're currently involved in. We've been involved with them since 2001. They have some smaller park projects that I believe have some similar relevance here in the type of approach. And that's really what's depicted in the package I've given to you today. But also in here is a reference to this neighborhood park portfolio if, on your own time, you want to take a look a little bit more about us.

But the reality is, we can give you a master plan concept. We can give you realistic budgets. We can come meet with you. We facilitated numerous community workshops from a

certifications, safety requirements, you name it. Hands down, we're qualified to do it from a design standpoint. So with that, I'll leave it in your hands, if anybody has any questions.

THE CHAIR: Mr. Argus.

MR. ARGUS: Question, if we wanted to go after state or federal grants, do you all have any experience in doing that?

MR. RINARD: We have some limited experience. I would not say we're the grant or fund-writing experts. I do have -- we work -- we do have a relationship with a person who's been very successful with that here in Tampa. And if that were something that we'd want to look at, we absolutely have the ability to contact, not only this person, but other avenues to research that kind of stuff.

MR. ARGUS: Thank you.

THE CHAIR: Any other questions? Well, thank you.

MR. RINARD: Thank you.

MR. SHOFFSTALL: Wow. Wow. My name is Carl Shoffstall. We're Florida PlayStructures and Water Features, and we're based out of Plant City, Florida. I'll leave everybody a

card here. I put a package together. Two things your CDD had contacted me. We, again, are in playground business, water features, playgrounds, fountains, interactive water features, and all of that. We are licensed general contractors. We're licensed state electricians, general con -- pool and spa contractors, as well as I am a CPSI, certified playground safety inspector. I do inspections all over the state or just what you have here, what we're looking at on your project. And I'm also -- I have certification from the National Contractors Association for Installation of Playgrounds. We've been in this -- doing this for 30 years. Again, we're a design build team, not quite as that gentleman's are, but we look in and -- we go in and look at -- I don't look at the site work as far as the streets and stuff like that. I'd be telling you a nontruth, but we do take it from the park in. We can do the design, and, you know, we'll work with you, however you guys want to do it.

going to eventually have to come -- they're going to have to look at putting warning labels on them, that shade tops are not used for trampolines or sleeping or whatever they do up there.

So without getting into it, I put together two packages there for you just to take a look at some equipment. One of the things that -- again, with the City of Sarasota, I sit on their park and rec advisory board. And one of the things that we've been looking at overall in the city parks, the same thing that, again, this young lady was talking about, that -- line of sight, everything that has to be open. And we're getting a lot of older stuff, the crawl tubes, and things like that are going away. And it's more hand/eye dexterity equipment that you can actually see through, and you can't hide in -- inside the crawl tubes and stuff like that. So, again, that's getting off a little bit on a tangent. But we can sit down with you and we can design

Water issues, I saw over there on the second park, the swings had water on them on

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was absolutely the truth. You couldn't get down the street. You have all wood structure there. They are no longer ASTM CPSC certified -- or compliant. You have a couple of ADA issues, and your equipment is all wood, and that's just not looked at in the commercial sector anymore. That's, you know -- it's not approved or -- it's frowned on.

Shade -- our shade top, shade structures, we're having that issue all over the state right now. I don't know if it's become, because of shade structures are getting a lot more popular, a Florida thing. I just finished a big playground, about a 15,000-square-foot playground in the City of Sarasota. The police have pictures of people getting up on the tops and using them as hammocks. So your issue there is not, again, is not any uncommon. That's what's going around everywhere.

I've been working with a couple different shade structures, manufacturers about, we put warning labels, and we put signage on all the playground equipment that we put out there. And I'm talking to them about that. I don't know what the solution is, but I think it's

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Sunday. Like I say, those parks are heavily used, so it's going to take a good design to turn around and, you know, update your equipment and make sure everything fits.

Your shade tops, as an inspector, are way too low. You have them within four feet of the area, and people are going to be able to get up on top of them. So, I mean, again, there's lots of issues, but again, if you take everything out of there, you've got a clean palette that we can do a design.

THE CHAIR: Thank you. Any questions? Thank you again.

MR. SHOFFSTALL: All right. Thank you. I left a catalog with everybody of one of the manufacturers that we work with. You can have a wish list. See what you like.

MS. STEWART: Obviously, this is probably perfect timing, because you're going to be getting into your budget discussion, so I'm sure this is going to be a significant capital improvement project for you, so --

THE CHAIR: A hundred thousand will cover it. Right?

MR. SHOFFSTALL: Close.

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THE CHAIR: All right. Any other -- any other discussion on this line item here, the playground improvement, contractors?

MR. ZEIGLER: The only thing that comes to my mind is if the experts in this field have any knowledge of any upcoming or proposed pending changes to the criteria of the equipment, meaning, if we buy it now, will it become outdated in two or three years or noncompliant in two or three years. So I want to make sure that's on the table, so anything that could be an upgrade that we could do now to keep our project as viable as long as possible would be important.

MR. SHOFFSTALL: Surfacing is the big issue right now with what they're doing with surfacing, and it's 2010 -- I think, Tonja -- was when the ADA was written -- rewritten for accessibility, and that's the biggest changes that have come about.

Most of the manufacturers in playground, whether it be mine or somebody else's, it all goes through IPEMA, International Playground and Equipment Association. Pretty much everything is current and will be current for a

the books. Whether this gentleman or I do it, I mean, at least get some ideas on what you would like to see.

I mean, I've designed them where I went -- I look at this and I say, "Man, this is the best thing since sliced bread," I take it to their board, and they say, "What were you thinking about?"

MR. CHESNEY: Yeah. I'm not talking about detail. I mean, you've both been in our neighborhoods. You kind of have an idea of what we have, what our neighborhood's like, and I'm sure you've done lots of projects for similar neighborhoods. So what they similarly would have, like an estimate. See, she is already raising her hand for specifics.

MS. FALKNER: I understand the issues of neighborhoods and all that. But when you're ---you know, when you're thinking about, like, the level of kids, I mean, when I look at this playground, it's not till really now my kids are truly enjoying it. I've been to other parks where there's smaller equipment, because there's a lot of little kids here. And then there's a section where it's little kids,

smaller slides, smaller -- you know --MR. SHOFFSTALL: That's a design, I'm sure.

MS. FALKNER: Agility things, and they can, obviously, grow into what we have now, which the four-to-six-year-old love. But when they were little --

MR. RINARD: Yeah. I mean, we have the ability to do that. I'd be more than happy to look at some of the recent projects we did for Tampa Palms and share the overall budgets. The hesitancy I have about that, it's just like Carl's catalog, I mean, you have the range from simple to just in playground equipment, and all of a sudden, you may look at, okay, maybe we want to connect walkways or replace concrete or replace safety surfacing and their levels of surfacing. And all of a sudden, you all see this number, whatever, a hundred thousand, 200,000, whatever it is, and all of a sudden, you're mentally locked into that. And then when you get into this process, whether you go the avenue of design, you know, bid or if you go design/build, I don't know, it can work against you.

while. I don't see any major changes in equipment. We're coming out with new equipment, getting bolder, higher, fly farther, all that kind of things. But that's -- that's the new and improved stuff for the playground stuff. Playgrounds aren't like when I was a child, for sure, so --

THE CHAIR: Mr. Chesney.

THE CHAIR: Yes. Well, along those

But generally speaking, I'd say six months would be a safe -- you know, just starting point to say, hey, without knowing exactly how much you're going to end up doing, we can turn the design around within 60 days with your input. You know, some -- I'll be honest, a client usually slows things up a little bit, just because there's a lot of buy-in, and we get that. So that would be a flex.

And then there may be some permit-related issues, you know, associated with that, that, you know, I know we've had these projects recently at Tampa Palms, we ended up having to

MR. BALDWIN: You would end up budgeting for a revenue source coming in, like proceeds, and then you would still have a budget for the expense.

MR. CHESNEY: In other words --

MR. BALDWIN: But it wouldn't affect your assessments, so --

MR. CHESNEY: -- we'd figure out how long we'd do it for, so five years.

MR. BALDWIN: Correct. So the only thing I was bringing up is making sure that if you're going to use assessments, that this -- tonight is setting your high level for assessments. If you're going to go out and receive a loan or a grant or something like that, then it's not going to affect your assessments. We're just

MR. CHESNEY: Yeah.

MR. ARGUS: So the things we have to account for, find sources for, immediately would be the design of the project?

THE CHAIR: Well, you're begging -you're putting that question out there. Are you going to do a design -- are you going to hire a designer and then we bid out the

construction component, or are you going to do a design/build bid. Two different options. I don't know that we're prepared to do that today.

MR. RINARD: You're holding us up. MR. BALDWIN: Well, I'm looking at your current budget now. And you do have improvement park for \$508,000 -- well, \$508,084, which is --

MR. CHESNEY: I put a little money in it. MR. BALDWIN: Which is 400,000 for the playground and a 20 percent increase for landscaping. It's in -- in other words, there are moneys currently in your budget sitting out there now. I just didn't know what the scope of the range was. I just wanted to make my point.

MR. CHESNEY: I just took a random-ass guess.

MR. ROSS: I want to make sure I understand what you just said. That's in the existing year's budget --

THE CHAIR: No.

MR. ROSS: -- or that's in the proposed budget?

MR. RINARD: If we're able to move quickly. And we have the ability to jump on it right now. But just the permitting aspects.

MR. ARGUS: All right. So let's assume you come up with a brilliant design, and we have absolutely no changes. Then the next step is go get permitting?

MR. RINARD: Yes. We need to go through permitting, if there are permitting-related aspects. Again, the County, City, 30 days. If you have comments again, you have to resubmit. So there's another 30 days there. Dealing

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mean, ordering equipment has been a challenge. Getting it has been a little bit of a challenge.

MR. ARGUS: So, essentially, we could sort of allow some extra time in there, start the designing this year and fund the equipment next year in next year's budget.

THE CHAIR: My gut tells me, there's no reason to delay.

MR. ARGUS: Okay.

THE CHAIR: If we have the funding sources, we should go ahead and do the project.

MR. CHESNEY: Yeah, you can do it over multiple years.

THE CHAIR: It could -- the project could span. We don't -- we only meet every 30 days, so to speak, so we're not an entity that you can get a strategic decision out of every day, like some of the others you may work with. So that is -- there's a natural delay when you deal with a government board that only meets once a month. And we know that sometimes we take a while to make decisions. So I added 120 days to the numbers you gave me in my own mind, because that's just the way it works, in my

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experience.

So I'm going switch gears slightly and let everybody think about this. Tonja, you want to go ahead, because I think you have some issues as well.

MS. STEWART: I do. In regard to the paving project for the Greens and for Stonebridge, I did contact the contractor Ajax, and we redid their -- their numbering based on matching the unit pricing for the Greens. They were willing to do that. We had a couple of mobilization differences. But the bottom line is, the price came out to 504,459.35 for the Greens. And -- oh, I'm sorry, let me do that again. \$36,330.95 for Stonebridge. 466,328.40 for the Greens. And then the -- we did a change order for the Greens alleys and the roadways, which was \$96,222.

What happened was, when we started adding all these numbers together, the budget that I had created back in '08 or whatever, when we increased the numbers based on current petroleum pricing, I had like \$575,000. When Sonny started looking at the numbers, we only had like 466-something-thousand dollars in

MR. BALDWIN: I mean, what I'm pulling is strictly from the budget, and I'm looking at the proposed budget. Postage and freight is around 2500. Printing and binding is around 4,000, and then there's some office supplies associated with your agenda packages around 550. You're talking a little over 7,000.

MR. MENDENHALL: Okay. So, yeah, it's pretty substantial.

THE CHAIR: Andy, what's your experience with the iPads?

MR. MENDENHALL: Well, we have -- I sit on the CDD board in Northwood, and we started using them there probably about a year and a half ago. And it's been a pretty good experience so far. We receive everything electronically. Nobody receives a hard copy. When we do have a rare instance of not having

But it's a pretty fair amount, only because with your hard copies, you have -- obviously, your meeting minutes are a little bit larger than a traditional board because of the fact yours are transcribed, your financials are pretty large as well. So it's -- you know, it can be pretty expensive.

And, you know, another thing to consider is, perhaps, if -- if most of you still want to receive hard copies, maybe for, say, for example, for the financials for even the

received something, it's usually because there's a vendor making a presentation, and they usually bring copies in person. You know, essentially, the -- our management company e-mails us out everything. They send us updates through the iPads. They've created generic seat e-mail addresses, so that it also (inaudible) it makes it very easy when we have -- when we have legal requests for records retention and that sort of thing, that it's easier to kind of pull together all the information, rather than potentially district records going to personal e-mail addresses or that sort of thing, which sometimes happens. So, so far, it's been a positive experience. I've never been one that's big on paper. So for me personally it works great. I've seen -we've had a couple board members that are a little bit more paper intensive than I was. It seems to be working for them a year and a half into it.

Cheval has their district that we manage. They have been using it for longer than that period of time. And Oakstead as well. Oakstead CDD, they use the iPad. And they've

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had, at least from I've seen, they've had good success. They also -- Cheval is wanting to --they use Dropbox where their different -- their different vendors, as well as the professional staff, will go and upload files there, and then, you know, the board can pull them down, you know, relatively quick ahead of the meeting, or even if they're sitting in the meeting, and they send an e-mail, they can go pull the document. So it seems to come in pretty handy.

MR. ARGUS: Do any of your -- the boards that you know about use the iPad and other -- is it all the same type of equipment, or can you have some Android, some iPad?

MR. MENDENHALL: At least so far, every district that I've dealt with has used the iPads. Slightly different versions, depending on when they came on board with it. But at least so far, they've all used the iPads. I would imagine that there'd really be -- there would be no difficulty with using a different platform. Because when it comes down to it, it's a means of delivering the information electronically rather than, you know, the end

for us to access. So I'm in favor of it.

THE CHAIR: Anyone else? MR. ZEIGLER: I agree.

MR. ARGUS: I think it's worth trying.

THE CHAIR: May I ask what you're in favor of, Mr. Ross?

MR. ROSS: I'm in favor of us trying to move beyond receiving physical agenda packages and receiving electronic packages with supporting materials and whatever's appropriate to facilitate that. So by way of example, that means the district buy five tablets and district owns it, and they're assigned to us, and we have assigned e-mails and whatever else they recommend that facilitates that, that's what we do.

expertise in these areas, and he ends up doing a lot of their work. I mean, in theory, if you look at the contract, they would -- are supposed to handle the whole thing. They're supposed to come out, measure it, prepare the specs, you know, handle the bids, the -- what is it when they come on site, the onsite visit. They're supposed --

MR. MENDENHALL: They do the -- MR. CHESNEY: Yeah.

There might be a district manager in that place, and they take more of the breadth of the expertise, whereas when you have the field manager or somebody like Doug, Doug, obviously, has some of not

myself, and the OLM representative usually does to take a look at financials, take a look at the questionnaires that make those determinations.

MR. CHESNEY: Well, Andy, I thought that from our last meeting, you were going to look at a way to revise it to be more inclusive of smaller and medium-sized vendors.

MR. MENDENHALL: Well, I'm definitely not going to be an expert for that. We would probably want OLM to, you know, give them that direction, to say we want to make sure that we aren't excluding smaller vendors. A lot of that prequalification, if you look at it, it is -- it is geared towards -- it seems to me that the primary motive of it is to get you larger contractors. So I don't know what we have left, if you try to parse it down to make it more inclusive. I think you get rid of the intent of it. But we can certainly ask them.

MR. CHESNEY: Well, I mean, the intent of it is, we want to hire someone that's going to be able to complete the job. So are there other methods to -- normally, in construction projects, you bond them. You don't really care

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only the local expertise, but the -- the working with knowledge of having been doing this for a while.

MR. CHESNEY: So -- and given the fact that it looks like Doug has done much of the work, perhaps you can get it to \$2,000.

MR. MENDENHALL: Oh, yeah. I have no problem at all talking to them about that. That's not a problem. I think one of the things you also have to decide, and it's been alluded to a couple times, or at least what I'm going to say has been alluded to a couple times, is that one big component of using OLM in the bid process is the prequalification portion, where there's -- there's a survey, essentially, that asks a bunch of questions, and then is used as a cutoff point for vendors of -- mainly from a financial standpoint.

If you -- two things. Number one, if you choose to not use the prequalification method, that's fine. We just need to let them know -- let OLM know. But that also takes a good deal of the work off their shoulders as well, because that's -- you know, there's a review process that goes along with it that Doug,

MR. MENDENHALL: Yeah. Not really. I mean, the -- you know, the prequalification is taking a look at the financial standing in the company and the wherewithal of it. So, you know, in the same way, with a lot of these companies, I mean, Doug, there's -- I know, as well as some of you may know, their background in the industry, what else they're doing, what other projects, similar projects, that sort of thing. To me, in a lot of cases, that's going to give you similar information with -- without necessarily excluding some companies.

MR. CHESNEY: Yeah. Well --MR. MENDENHALL: You can do that research as a one-off rather than as a -- as pregualification.

MR. CHESNEY: Yeah. I mean, is there a way we can do it? Because I'll give you an example. Our contractor that went bankrupt, a lot of those questions relate to size. Well, size is irrelevant when it comes to completing

a job. It's liquidity that's important. You can have a hundred-thousand-dollar contract, you have 200,000 in the bank. You're going to be able to complete that job, no problem. But if you have a \$500,000 job and you have a hundred thousand in the bank, you're going to be stretched, even though you look a lot bigger and have more employees and you got fancier trucks or whatever.

So, I mean, there's got to be a way to come up with something that shows they're able to complete the job without cutting off smaller contractors.

MR. MENDENHALL: Right. I agree. To me, there's definitely -- you know, when -- whenever we -- and I have many districts where they either don't use OLM, or when they use OLM, they don't use a prequalification questionnaire. So in those instances, we usually do a fair amount of research on those bidders that are, you know, being chosen from. My only question -- and I think it's a good method, because, you know, you can see a lot more by talking to the companies, you know, calling the folks that they have as references.

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think OLM should -- they -- that's what they do for a living. They should be able to figure this out, and Erin should be able to help us make sure we don't do something stupid.

MR. MENDENHALL: That's -- yeah. I mean, that's something we can pose to them. And, you know, depending on how fast the board wants to move, this is something where we could have, you know -- as far as our bid specs, Doug has been working on them, gotten together some information, that was forwarded on to board. So I think we're at -- at a point where we probably have good bid specs.

As far as using some sort of a prequalification modified that would allow for other companies to have a better opportunity to participate, did you want me to go get that and bring that back at the next meeting as, here's the package that we're ready to advertise and put to bid, or are you looking to move quicker and have this advertised and, you know, kind of let OLM run with it, so to speak, with just those instructions?

MS. McCORMICK: I think -- I think under our rules, as part of the prequalification

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1 process, the board ultimately needs to be 2 involved in that. So either we go with, you 3 know, the prequalification process that OLM has 4 provided, or if we're going to modify it, we 5 would need to bring it back to the board. And 6 this issue with the prequalification process, I 7 mean, if you didn't have the prequalify -- if 8 you didn't have any prequalification process, 9 then, at the end of the day, we would just be 10 doing this on a straight bid basis. So whoever 11 provides the low bid, as long as they're a 12 qualified responsive and responsible bidder, 13 and that, you know --14

MS. McCORMICK: That would be for professionals under the consultants competitive negotiation.

If they think it's inadequate, they should have had e-mails and memos to our staff saying such.

So it just was irksome to me, and I felt it was less than what I would expect of our professional service.
